PRODUCTION NOTES

Anything Goes is a 1934 musical with music and lyrics by Cole Porter. The story concerns madcap antics aboard an ocean liner bound from New York to London. Billy Crocker is a stowaway in love with heiress Hope Harcourt, who is engaged to Lord Evelyn Oakleigh. Nightclub singer Reno Sweeney and Public Enemy #13 Moonface Martin aid Billy in his quest to win Hope. The musical introduced such songs as "Anything Goes", "You're the Top", and "I Get a Kick Out of You."

The musical debuted in 1934 at the Alvin Theatre (now known as the Neil Simon Theatre) on Broadway. It ran for 420 performances, becoming the fourth longest-running musical of the 1930s, despite the impact of the Great Depression on Broadway patrons' disposable income. It starred Ethel Merman as Reno Sweeney, William Gaxton as Billy Crocker, and Victor Moore as Moonface Martin. Since its 1934 debut on Broadway, the musical has been revived several times in the United States and Britain and has been filmed twice. The musical has long been a popular choice for school and community productions.

For the 1987 Broadway revival (the version we are producing), producers updated the script and re-ordered the musical numbers using Cole Porter songs from other Porter shows, a practice which the composer often engaged in. The music was rescored for a 16-piece swing band, in the style of early Benny Goodman, instead of the earlier 28-piece orchestrations. It starred Patti LuPone as Reno Sweeney, Howard McGillin as Billy, Bill McCutcheon as Moonface, and Anthony Heald as Lord Evelyn. It was nominated for ten Tony Awards (including nominations for McGillin, LuPone, McCutcheon, and Heald), winning for Best Revival of a Musical, Best Featured Actor (McCutcheon), and Best Choreography.

This Summer's Theme and Service Project

In keeping with SPA's 2018 theme of "Many Voices, One Community," the high school students participated in a donation drive competition for the Community Violence Intervention Center (CVIC) and the Hope Care Center & Food Pantry. Students were split into teams and brought in a variety of non-perishable foods and toiletry items throughout the month of June. In total, just over 2,000 items were collected! The top three teams that brought in the most items received prizes sponsored by Red Ray Lanes, Northern Air, and SPA parents. The first place team included Ethan Walker, Sydney Boucher, Manya Chaturvedi, Manan Chaturvedi, Rayevinn Martin, Hannah Quinn, Nicholas Schlief, and Ethan Wosick. While all the students certainly enjoyed the competitive aspect of the service project, they also grew more confident in their abilities to help others in their very own community. Thank you to all students, staff, and community members/businesses who made this donation drive such a success!

NOTES FROM THE SPA ADMINISTRATION

I hope you are ready to sit back and enjoy today's performance. As you do, let the talent, energy, and smiles allow you to escape for a bit into what will be a tremendous performance.

When I first meet people they often ask what SPA is all about. Recently, for a group of school counselors, I explained it this way: S. P. A. stands for...

$S - a \underline{S}eat$ for everyone – the program expands to fit the need

You will see that sometimes the stage gets a bit crowed – but that is a good thing. One of the best things that SPA does is to provide a place for all students that want to be involved. The elementary, middle school, and high school SPA is designed to adjust to the number of students that sign up each summer. Sometimes this can be a challenge, but it is a challenge that is well worth the time and expense to make it happen.

$P - \underline{P}$ lenty of options for everyone – not just music, but dance, drama, and tech

SPA is also designed to provide a variety of learning experiences. Each production has a unique set of "problems" that need to be solved. The curriculum each summer is designed around the production needs. For example, the cast of Anything Goes is getting a heavy dose of tap dance. The cast of How to Succeed is learning all about hairstyles of the 50's. And the Tech Team is learning all about programming LED light strips. This "production-based" curriculum provides a unique opportunity to apply new knowledge immediately. Along with the productions, there are specialty classes in a variety of topics like make-up, costumes, and set construction.

$A - \underline{A}$ ffordable for all students

A key to the development of SPA over the years has been the support of the community. Because of the support of businesses and individual donors, SPA has been able to provide a number of special offerings over the years – things we would have not been able to offer or provide without the outside funding. One of these special things SPA has is the Mentor Program which has been helping targeted students since the summer of 2000. This funding is also used to support our scholarship program which assures that no student will ever be turned away due to any financial need.

So that is one way to look at SPA. But maybe for today you should just sit back and enjoy the performance. Enjoy the talent, the energy and the smiles. Thank you for attending!

It was early may of 1979 when Doug Fosse pulled me out of Concert Choir rehearsal to ask me if I would be interested in working with the Summer Children's Theatre program. That summer Doug, Dean Opp, and I became the summer staff. Almost immediately Dean and I would pitch the idea of doing something "music theatre" for high school kids in the summer. Doug's response was always "I work with that age group all year long. I really enjoy the change of pace".

Not being the best listeners, we had a few forays into projects with Jr High-aged kids in late afternoons and early evenings, which led to staging a recital of Jocelyn (Dubourt) Sherwood's high school voice students. The following year was "An Evening with Andrew Lloyd Weber" and SPA was born.

20,000+ students, 500+ performances, 190,000 audience members! From very humble beginnings the program flourished. This year 1,400+ students will participate in SPA. DIRECTOR'S NOTES

We chose *Anything Goes* for this year's 9th-10th grade production for many reasons. It has absolutely beautiful music, fast-paced and fun show-stopping dance numbers, a funny script, and tons of roles for student involvement.

When our cast list was posted, it contained 89 students... all of whom just finished 8th and 9th grade. Producing a musical is already a large undertaking, full of logistical challenges that require creativity to solve. These challenges are multiplied when we have a cast of 89. How do we place 89 students on the stage and have it look clean? How do we create enough stage space for dance numbers? How does every student get a little moment to be featured? How do we get 89 fourteen and fifteen year-olds to listen to us at the same time during rehearsals? Where do we put 87 people when there are only two acting on stage? How do we costume 89 people- some of whom require multiple costumes? Fortunately, we are used to solving these challenges because this is the fourth time in five years that the 9th-10th grade SPA show has had a cast of over 80 students. This is a testament to how much students in our region value involvement in the performing arts.

Each cast has its own personality, and the directing team agrees that this cast was extremely polite, hard working, talented, and just a lot of fun. Great job students for bringing the positive attitude every day! Great job parents and guardians for raising fantastic young people!

Thank you so much for choosing to attend this performance. The cast, crew, and staff hope you enjoy what we've prepared for you.
